HHS LAUNCHES HEALTHY PEOPLE 2030 National objectives to improve health and well-being

On August 18, 2020, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) unveiled <u>Healthy People</u> 2030, a set of science-based, 10-year national objectives to improve health and well-being in the United States. An interdisciplinary team of subject matter experts developed the Healthy People 2030 national health objectives and targets, which focus on high-impact public health issues and how the conditions where people live, work, and play affect their health and well-being.

Since 1980, the Healthy People initiative has built on the knowledge and success gained to address current and emerging public health challenges. Healthy People 2030 contain <u>14 objectives related to oral health</u> <u>and one developmental objective</u>, with a focus on improving health by increasing access to oral health care, including preventive services.

AUGUST IS NATIONAL IMMUNIZATION AWARENESS MONTH CDC issues toolkit and resources for patients and providers

In the U.S., HPV (human papilloma virus) causes more than 33,700 cases of cancer in men and women each year. The safe and effective HPV vaccine can prevent most of these cases. HPV vaccine prevents five types of cancer, including oral cancers.

To help health care professionals communicate with their patients about immunizations, including HPV, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has produced <u>toolkits and resources</u>, including key

messages to help patients stay up-to-date on their vaccines, social media messages, graphics, and educational resources.

CDC's recent <u>"Interim Guidance for Immunization Services during</u> <u>the COVID-19 Pandemic</u>" can also help health professionals plan for safe vaccine administration during the COVID-19 pandemic.



CODA ACCREDITS DENTAL THERAPY EDUCATION PROGRAM IN ALASKA Improves health equity, serves those outside traditional oral health delivery system

The American Dental Association's Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA), which accredits all U.S. education programs for dentists and dental hygienists, has granted accreditation to a dental therapy education program for the first time, acknowledging the successful program at Ilisaģvik College in Utqiaģvik, Alaska. This is a victory for underserved communities and dental therapists who help make dental care more accessible. Dental therapy has bipartisan support and is proven to increase access to dental care. The National Partnership for Dental Therapy has long fought for more dental care access. The partnership brings together a diverse group of supporters including Community Catalyst, the National Indian Health Board and the National Coalition of Dentists for Health Equity.

The CDC Division of Oral Health is now accepting applications for the 2021-2022 Dental Public Health Residency (DPHR) Program. This formal training program produces skilled specialists in dental public health who can work collaboratively with their public health and dental colleagues in an array of health settings to achieve improved oral health for populations. MARYLAND CERTIFIES MORE THAN 600 CHWs Four CHW training programs accredited

There is still time to join the more than 600 Marylanders who have become certified community health workers (CHWs)! CHWs have two pathways to certification in Maryland.

CHWs may continue to apply for certification based on experience until 30 days after the state of emergency ends in Maryland. CHWs may also apply for certification based on the completion of an accredited CHW certification training program. COMMUNITY WATER FLUORIDATION Celebrating 75 years!

The article below was submitted by the Maryland Department of Health Office of Oral Health:

This year (2020) marks the 75th Anniversary of Community Water Fluoridation in the United States. The first fluoridation of a public water supply was introduced in Grand Rapids, Michigan, in 1945. Since then, cities and states across the U.S. have undertaken this important step in promoting oral health. As a result, in 1999 the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recognized water fluoridation as one of the ten



greatest public health achievements of the 20th century.

Fluoride occurs naturally in water, but the controlled adjustment of fluoride in a public water supply can help to reduce tooth decay. In Maryland, approximately 93% of residents receive naturally occurring or supplemented fluoridated water.

Oral health affects every aspect of our lives: sleep, mental health, heart and lung health, diet, and social connections. Promoting good oral health practices and preventing tooth decay is imperative to overall wellness.

Drinking water with fluoride (most tap water) -- along with other basic oral health practices such as using fluoridated toothpaste and flossing -- provides children and adults safe and effective protection against tooth decay!

HPI: Economic Impact of COVID-19 on the Dental Care Sector (Insights from Data for The Maryland Adult Dental Waiver Program is off to a terrific start! According to Maryland Medicaid, from January 1, 2020 through Aiugust 18, 2020::

- 4,303 claims were submitted
- 2,694 unique members filed valid claims
- 111 members met annual \$800 cap
- 483 unique providers submitted claims
- \$690,852.97 paid year-to-date

From program launch on June 1, 2019 through December 31, 2019:

- 8,005 claims were submitted
- 4,262 unique members filed valid claims
- 295 members met annual \$800 cap
- 564 unique providers submitted claims
- \$1,358,627.30 paid

Note: 2019 numbers have been adjusted to reflect claims received after the first of the year for services performed in 2019.

Oral disease and injury prevention:

- Promote community-based oral disease and injury prevention programs.

Oral health literacy and education:

- Increase understanding of the relationship between oral health and overall health, and promote good oral health practices and access to oral health care.
- Improve collaboration between oral health and other health and human services providers so that patients understand how to navigate the oral health care system and establish a dental home.
- Educate medical professionals and students about the importance of the oral/systemic connection and foster collaboration between medical and dental disciplines and communities.
