

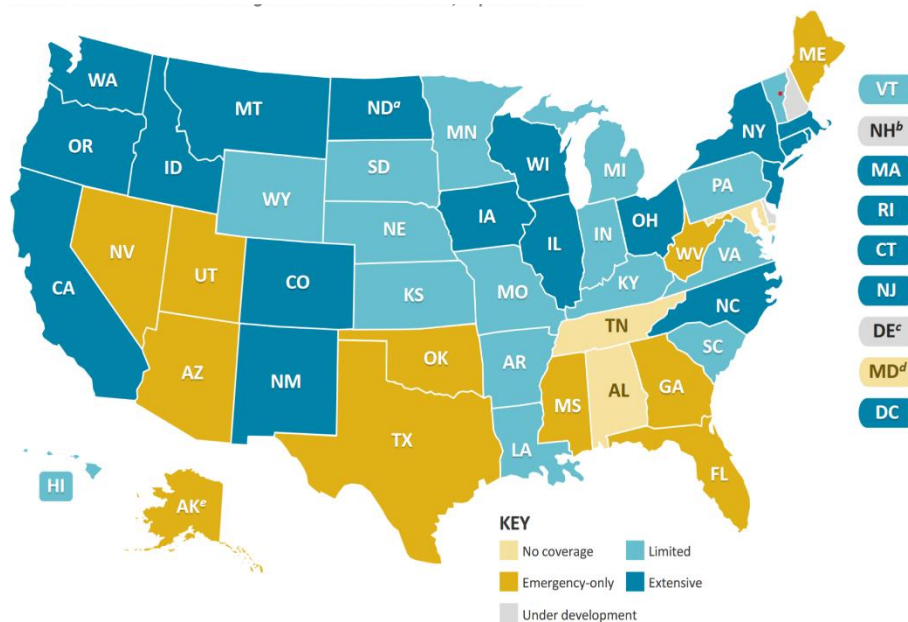
It's Time to Close the Gap. Dental Care is Health Care.

Support Adult Dental Coverage in Maryland Medicaid

Maryland is just one of three states without adult dental coverage in Medicaid

Maryland is behind almost every other state in dental coverage in Medicaid. Over thirty other states provide comprehensive or limited adult dental coverage in their programs. The remaining states provide some dental coverage to most adults in their programs in emergency situations – except for the three states of Maryland, Alabama, and Tennessee.

Maryland has pockets of adult coverage in Medicaid: dually eligible adults under the age of 65, pregnant and postpartum individuals, and young adults who have aged out of foster care. Managed care organizations may provide some basic benefits – but Maryland law does not require it, so that it could change at any time. This means that 800,000 adults are left without a reliable source of adult dental coverage that meets their needs for basic preventative and restorative services.

Dental coverage can transform the life of someone you know

One in four Marylandersⁱ is covered by Medicaid. We all know someone who is covered by Medicaid, and that person may be a friend, family member, or even ourselves. Dental care can transform lives. If someone suffers from poor oral health, they may face many struggles, including:

- managing dental pain;
- controlling a chronic disease;
- obtaining a job; or
- even eating.

Dental coverage can mean the difference between suffering and living a productive life for many Marylanders.

Dental coverage is not a Medicaid cost. It's an investment.

There is a reason that a majority of states provide dental coverage to adults in their Medicaid program. Health care cannot be delivered effectively without dental care. The lack of adult dental coverage drives up health care costs and contributes to health disparities, making it difficult to keep our communities healthy:

- People go to emergency rooms because they can't get preventative dental care. This costs \$10 million a year for Maryland Medicaid.ⁱⁱ
- Basic dental care can lower cost of managing chronic diseases, saving \$236 for each preventative dental visit.ⁱⁱⁱ

States can leverage federal investment of millions of dollars, and Maryland is leaving that investment on the table. Federal dollars pay for at least half of Medicaid.
