MDAC SEEKS SUPPORT FOR MEDICAID ADULT DENTAL BILL Sign on now to show your support of an adult dental benefit in Maryland Medicaid

MDAC is seeking support of a bill to expand dental coverage to all adults in Maryland Medicaid. Although dually eligible adults under age 65, pregnant and postpartum people, and young adults who have aged out of foster care have some dental coverage through Maryland Medicaid, far too many adults do not, resulting in oral health issues that make it difficult to manage dental pain, control a chronic disease, obtain employment, or even eat, speak, or socialize.

Maryland is just one of three states without adult dental coverage in Medicaid. More than 30 states provide comprehensive or limited adult dental coverage in their Medicaid programs. The remaining states provide some dental coverage to most adults in emergency situations, except for the states of Maryland, Alabama, and Tennessee.

During the 2022 legislative session, oral health champions Senator Malcolm L. Augustine (D-Prince George's County), Senator Guy Guzzone (D-Howard County), Delegate Bonnie L. Cullison (D-Montgomery County), and Delegate Michael W. McKay (R-Allegany & Washington Counties) will sponsor a bill that would add a comprehensive adult dental benefit to Maryland Medicaid. 

NIDCR ISSUES FOLLOW-UP TO 2000 ORAL HEALTH IN AMERICA REPORT Chronic oral health issues, access to care still problematic despite advances

Oral Health in America: Advances and Challenges, a new report from the National Institute of Health's National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research (NIDCR), highlights the national importance of oral health and its relationship to overall health. Despite importance advances in the understanding and treatment of oral diseases and conditions since the issuance of Oral Health in America: A Report of the Surgeon General 20 years ago, many Americans still have chronic oral health problems and lack access to care.

The new report, a roadmap to improve the nation's oral health, recognizes the oral health achievements of the past 20 years and focuses on new scientific and technological knowledge and innovations that provide promising new directions to improve equitable access to oral health care. It also features best practices from across the nation, including Maryland's Healthy Teeth, Healthy Kids successful social marketing campaign.

ASTDD LAUNCHES NATIONAL ORAL HEALTH DATA PORTAL Centralizes oral health data sources in one national platform

The Association of State & Territorial Dental Directors (ASTDD) will soon launch a new<u>National Oral Health</u> <u>Data Portal</u>, the nation's first comprehensive, publicly accessible compilation of consolidated oral health data. The portal centralizes more than 30 separate federal, state, and other oral health datasets that include oral health status, workforce, access, cost, and quality of life information.

State and territorial dental directors and ASTDD program staff collaborated on the project to help ensure information in the oral health database is as complete and useful as possible to give epidemiologists, statisticians, care providers, policy makers, public health officials, legislators, researchers, and the public actionable local, state, and federal data to improve the oral health care system.

CAREQUEST, AIDPH ISSUE WHITE PAPER ON VETERANS ORAL HEALTH Outlines issues, recommendations to improve access, quality of care for veterans

A forward-thinking white paper from the CareQuest Institute and the American Institute of Dental Public Health (AIDPH) focuses on the need to better understand the significant issues surrounding veteran oral health.

<u>Veteran Oral Health: Expanding Access and Equity</u> addresses the social, structural, and individual drivers of disparate oral health outcomes experienced by veterans that deserve more attention from the oral health community. Roughly 19 million veterans in the U.S., who comprise about



6% of the total population, are more likely to have higher rates of tooth decay, gum disease, and an increased need for restorative dental care compared to non-veterans.

The paper identifies several strategic recommendations to improve access to and quality of care, including: expanding eligibility criteria for veterans to receive oral health services; expanding the role of Federally Qualified Health Centers and rural health clinics; and advancing medical-dental integration in veteran health care.

HHS ANNOUNCES AVAILABILITY OF NEARLY \$48 MILLION IN FUNDING Awards to increase public health workforce in rural and tribal communities

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Health Resources and Services Administration's (HRSA) Federal Office of Rural Health Policy, announced the availability of nearly \$48 million in American Rescue Plan funding for community-based organizations to expand public health capacity in rural and tribal communities through health care job development, training, and placement. Awardees will be able to use this funding to address workforce needs related to the long-term effects of COVID-19 as well as health information technology (IT) needs and other key workforce issues.

This notice of funding opportunity builds on the Biden-Harris Administration's **recent historic workforce announcement** of awarding the largest field strength in history for its health workforce loan repayment and scholarship programs.

The Rural Public Health Workforce Training Network Program addresses the critical need for more trained health professionals in rural communities. This investment will increase the number of well-trained health care professionals and connect them with future employers, including the hospitals and clinics who participate in this program. This approach benefits the workers who receive valuable training, as well as the participating health care providers who will be able to ensure the pool of potential employees is better prepared to provide culturally competent care that addresses specific needs at their sites. These rural communities will gain an expanded, highly trained workforce that will enhance quality of care and service delivery.

Awardees will establish community health networks, which may be composed of, but are not limited to, Tribal Colleges and Universities, Minority-Serving Institutions, community and technical colleges, critical access hospitals, community health centers, nursing homes, Rural Health Clinics, state or local workforce development boards, and substance abuse providers. HRSA anticipates more than 30 award recipients will be able to develop formal training and/or certification programs in order to increase capacity in the following workforce training tracks: community health support, health IT and/or telehealth technical support, community para-medicine, and case management staff and/or respiratory therapists.

Thousands of Maryland adults are accessing dental care through the Medicaid Adult Dental Waiver Program.

According to Maryland Medicaid, from January 1, 2021 through December 28, 2021:

- 8,666 claims were submitted
- 4,357 unique members filed valid claims
- 343 members met annual \$800 cap
- 586 unique providers submitted claims
- \$1,346,718.80 paid

From January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020:

- 7,942 claims were submitted
- 4,151 unique members filed valid claims
- 313 members met annual \$800 cap
- 576 unique providers submitted claims
- \$1,286,280.60 paid

Since the June 1, 2019 launch of the Medicaid Adult Dental Waiver Program, Medicaid has paid \$3,991,713.93 in dental services for thousands of Maryland adults.
