MD GENERAL ASSEMBLY WRAPS UP BUSY LEGISLATIVE SESSION Community grants program, dental hygienist scope of practice bills passed

During the 2019 legislative session, MDAC worked to keep access to oral health care top of mind with lawmakers. MDAC Executive Director Mary Backley testified before both the Senate Finance and House Health and Government Operations committees in support of SB 158/HB 332, the Community Dental Clinics Grant Program. The bill, sponsored by oral health champions Senator Guy Guzzone (D-Howard County) and Delegate Mike McKay (R-Washington and Allegany Counties), passed (nearly) unanimously and is expected to be signed by the Governor later this month.



A key goal for this legislative session was to ensure that legislators are aware of the need for Medicaid adult dental coverage for all eligible adults in Maryland. This was accomplished when MDAC Executive Director Mary Backley and representatives from the Maryland Department of Health briefed the House Public Health Subcommittee on implementation of the adult dental waiver program, including plans for the Medicaid collaborative.

All in all, it was a highly productive legislative session for oral health stakeholders. Key highlights include:

- HB 332/SB 158 Maryland Department of Health Community Dental Clinics Grant Program (Passed): Supports safety net providers in building dental capacity by paying for equipment, renovations, and construction. The bill supports implementation of the Medicaid adult dental waiver program, and complements the existing capital grants program for FQHCs. Beginning in fiscal year 2021, providers will be able to apply to the Maryland Department of Health for funding.
- HB 738 Dental Hygienist Scope of Practice Practice Settings under General Supervision (Passed): Expanded the settings in which dental hygienists can practice under general supervision to include physician offices providing primary or prenatal care, medical day, and group homes.
- SB 1030 The Blue Print for Maryland's Future (Passed): The bill is Part I for implementation of Kirwan Commission recommendations on K-12 education. This year, 100 Maryland schools in areas with a high concentration of poverty will receive \$240,000 in additional funding for health-related services, most of which is focused on primary care. However, dental services could be funded in certain circumstances. This bill is important as it sets a statutory precedent to include dental services in health services. The expectation is that funding for health-related services will increase next year.
- HB 698/SB 868 Consumer Protections and Maryland Health Insurance Commission Coverage (Passed): Establishes a workgroup to make recommendations on legislation next session regarding the need to codify consumer protections in the Affordable Care Act (ACA) in the unlikely event that the ACA is overturned.

MDAC FORMS MEDICAID ADULT DENTAL COLLABORATIVE Work underway to help ensure success of Medicaid waiver program

MDAC's Medicaid adult dental collaborative, formed to help ensure the success of the Medicaid adult dental waiver program, held its first meeting on April 26, 2019. Collaborative members include dental providers, social service professionals, and caregivers all working together to:

- 1. Ensure that eligible participants are aware of their new benefit and how to access it;
- 2. Increase the number of Medicaid providers and build capacity to serve the dual-eligible population; and

3. Evaluate the program, make course corrections as necessary, and provide feedback to Medicaid.

The Medicaid adult dental waiver program will go into effect on June 1, 2019. For the first time, more than 33,000 dual eligible adults ages 21-64 statewide will be able to access up to \$800 in diagnostic, preventive and restorative dental services per year.

\$1,600 benefit cap for first 18 months will give patients a good start on treatment plans

Although the benefit goes into effect mid-year, Medicaid will cover \$800 in dental services for 2019. Program participants will have coverage for up to \$1,600 in dental services during the first 18 months of the program. This will enable patients, many of whom may have extensive treatment needs, to work with their provider to develop a plan that addresses their most serious dental issues in a timely manner.

TREATING PATIENTS WITH ANXIETY AND SPECIAL NEEDS Dr. Harvey Levy to lead June 3 CE class hosted by MDAC



In support of the launch of the Medicaid adult dental waiver program, MDAC will host a continuing education class on treating patients with anxiety and special needs on June 3, 2019 at the Maryland State Dental Association.

If you are a dentist either enrolled or considering enrollment as a Maryland Healthy Smiles provider, and you intend to see adult patients under the Medicaid adult dental waiver program, this class is for you! Dr. Harvey Levy, a Frederick-based dentist and engaging teacher who frequently works with patients who need special care, will lead the class. Those who successfully complete the course will earn 3 free CEUs as approved by the Maryland State Board of Dental Examiners.

The Maryland Medicaid adult dental waiver program, which Dr. Levy supports, will go into effect on June 1, 2019. For the first time, more than 33,000 dual eligible (Medicaid/Medicare) adults will be able to access diagnostic, preventive and basic restorative dental services, as well as extractions, up to an annual cap of \$800.00.

MDAC REPORTS ON WORK TO IMPROVE ORAL HEALTH IN MD Initiatives focused on adults, children, adolescents

The Medicaid adult dental waiver program was a key topic of discussion at the April 29 MDAC members' meeting. Medicaid Collaborative Director Guli Fager outlined the work of the collaborative to help ensure utilization of the new dental benefit, recruit dentists to participate in Medicaid and build capacity, and evaluate and provide feedback on the program to Medicaid.

To help increase the number of Medicaid providers in the adult dental waiver program, the Maryland State Dental Association (MSDA) recently sent an update on the waiver program to their members to encourage their participation.

Within the next few weeks, eligible participants in the Medicaid adult dental waiver program will receive a welcome packet informing them of their new Medicaid dental benefit, which will go into effect June 1, 2019. The dual eligible population can be found in every county in the state, but the highest concentrations of

Although MDAC is working to ensure the success of the Medicaid adult dental waiver program, it is also actively working in other areas to help improve the oral and overall health of Marylanders. MDAC Executive Director Mary Backley gave a brief update on the work MDAC has undertaken since the beginning of this year, which includes:

- A statewide dental sealant needs assessment to determine the facilitators and barriers to expansion of school dental sealant programs and identify unmet needs, at-risk populations, and oral health disparities related to dental sealants.
- State and regional efforts to improve the oral health of adolescents ages 12-17 in the safety net provider system; and improve oral health behaviors of adolescents through oral health education.
- Updates to the statewide Healthy Teeth Healthy Kids/Dientes Sanos, Niños Sanos oral health literacy and education campaign.
- Implementation of the 2018-2023 Maryland Oral Health Plan, a five-year roadmap that outlines strategies to expand access to oral health care, prevent oral disease and injury, and improve the oral health and overall health of all Marylanders.

AFFORDABILITY MAJOR BARRIER TO ADULT ORAL HEALTH SERVICES Consumer study explores utilization by demographically distinct population groups

The results of a 2018 study to evaluate factors that consumers identify as barriers to accessing oral health services have been released by the Oral Health Workforce Research Center at the University at Albany, State University of New York's School of Public Health.

The most common barrier to accessing oral health services for adults was affordability. Of those who did not see a dentist in the past year, more than half indicated that they could not afford to do so. The next most common barriers were difficulty finding a dentist who would accept their dental benefit plan, fear of going to the dentist, and inability to find the time to see a dentist.

Factors consumers said would facilitate their access to adult dental services included dental insurance, having more dentists who accepted their insurance plan, and more convenient office hours.

<u>The full report</u> features statistics including the geographic distribution of respondents and distribution of self-reported need for dental care, with breakdowns by rural, suburban, or urban location.

Hamblin will replace Stephen A. Somers, PhD, CHCS' current president, CEO, and founder, who will be stepping down after 24 years. Hamblin is currently the senior vice president for program development, strategic planning, and financial management at CHCS.

"On behalf of the Center for Health Care Strategies Board of Trustees, I am delighted to announce our unanimous appointment of Allison Hamblin to lead CHCS into its next exciting chapter," said Estelle Richman, chair of the CHCS Board and former secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare. "Allison has been instrumental in taking CHCS' work to new heights over the last several years

and her leadership, strategic vision, and deep policy and delivery-system expertise are ideally suited to steer the organization's pioneering work to improve care delivery for Americans in need."

As part of CHCS' leadership transition, Tricia McGinnis, MPP, MPH, will assume the new role of executive vice president and chief program officer overseeing the organization's broad programmatic strategy.

Somers, who founded CHCS in 1995 as a start-up with three staff members and built it into a team of 55 staff with nationwide reach, will remain with the organization as a strategic advisor for select initiatives.
